The apostle Paul, as he writes to the Corinthian congregation, reminds them of this fact of being part of the Church. He writes, "Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who empowers them all in everyone" (1 Corinthians 12:4-6).

What this means, he goes on to say, is that there are many members of a church, but there is only one body. Each member has its own God-given role to play with its own God-given talents and abilities. No one gift or one service is better than another, just as no one member of the church is better than another. Rather, all of them work together to the praise and glory of God who joins the body together.

This is certainly true here at St. Peter Evangelical Lutheran Church. It is quite remarkable to see the varieties of gifts and varieties of service that God has given to His people here in this place. They are all different and, though we may be tempted to think otherwise, none is greater than another, because all come from God and are done to the praise of God.

Not only does this provide a chance for us to give thanks for all the ways that people serve here, but it also gives us a chance to see how we might serve in the future with the gifts and abilities that God has given us.

Thank you to those who look after the hymn boards which aid our worship.

Stewardship Under the Cross

Overcoming the Fear of Tithing

Your heart will always go where you put God's money.

Jesus said that where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. As the hymn verse has it: We give Thee but Thine own. God is the ultimate giver of our incomes: all these gifts come from him. To acknowledge this gift and our dependence on the Lord, God calls us to give a portion of our income back to Him for the maintenance of His Church. Indeed, the Scriptures are very clear: God calls His people to give generously to the work of the Church. As we have seen, God commanded Israel to support the Word and Sacrament ministry of the Levites in the Temple with a tithe (10%) of their income. Can we call ourselves generous by doing less?

This calls for faith. Do we trust God's Word? Do we trust that what He says is for our benefit, not our harm? If you have never tithed before, it can be a scary proposition. Give 10% of my income away!? You've got to be kidding. But God doesn't ever kid us in His Word. Instead, He tells us how to live holy and blessed lives full of peace and contentment. Consider these Scriptures:

Jesus said, "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. 20 But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also (Matthew 6:19-21).

"Will a man rob God? Yet you rob me. But you ask, 'How do we rob you?' "In tithes and offerings. 9 You are under a curse-- the whole nation of you-- because you are robbing me. 10 Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this," says the LORD Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it " (Malachi 3:8-10).

On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as each one of you may prosper (1 Cor. 16:2).

But just as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you also excel in this grace of giving (2 Corinthians 8:7).

The point is this: he who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and he who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must do as he has made up his mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that you may always have enough of everything and may provide in abundance for every good work (2 Cor. 9:6-8).

We do not make God poor when we fail to give money to Him properly, but we do make ourselves poor if we do not give according to the standards He sets for us in His Word, the Bible. God does not need our money, but we need to give the way the Bible tells us to in order to overcome the negative influence money and the things of this world can have on us.

God will never tell us to do something that will be to our harm – He loves us too much for that. Jesus gave His life on the cross for me. He loves me and knows what is best for me – so I can know that what He says about stewardship is meant for my benefit. He wants my heart to be with Him – and my heart will always follow where I put God's money. Tithing is not easy: it is godly. It will change your life. Stepping out in faith always does. You may have to change your lifestyle to accommodate following God's Word in this matter. But tithing will change your life in other ways too: it will give you a peace and contentment that can only come from actually putting yourself in the hands of the Lord.

So read through those Scriptures again. Pray through the questions on the next page. And step out in faith this year with giving that is in accord with God's Word. And just see if you are not blessed in it.

Elders' Corner

(A monthly feature from the Board of Elders)

Greetings in the name of Jesus.

As we continue in the season of Epiphany, we remember these words from our recent Epistle reading of 1 Corinthians 12:12-31: "12 For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit. ¹⁴ For the body does not consist of one member but of many. ¹⁵ If the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. 16 And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁷ If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? 18 But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. ¹⁹ If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰ As it is, there are many parts, yet one body. ²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." ²² On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and on those parts of the body that we think less honorable we bestow the greater honor, and our unpresentable parts are treated with greater modesty, ²⁴ which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving greater honor to the part that lacked it, ²⁵ that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶ If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together. ²⁷ Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. ²⁸ And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then miracles, then gifts of healing, helping, administrating, and various kinds of tongues. ²⁹ Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? ³⁰ Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues? Do all interpret? ³¹ But earnestly desire the higher gifts." GENERAL INFORMATION

Book of the Month: The Book of the Month will be available in the Parish Hall library. The February Book of the Month is *Battle of the Soul: Luther Reforms Vice & Virtue* by Michael T. Fieberkorn. Here is an excerpt from the book: "Many Christians mistakenly think that following Jesus will be relatively easy. Children complete confirmation instruction and feel as if a very large part of their work in the faith is now complete. A newly married husband and wife join a congregation and are baptized, expecting life to run more smoothly now that they are part of a church and worship regularly. Adult Christians who have been believers since the day they were baptized as infants assume they don't have to do anything, because they are saved by grace alone and Jesus has already done it all. We might get the impression that faith, once begun, can be set on cruise control until eventually we arrive at the intended destination. Experience shows that little could be further from reality."


FROM THE OFFICE

"I believe in the Holy Spirit...I cannot connect this article (as I have said) to anything better than Sanctification. Through this article the Holy Spirit, with His office, is declared and shown: He makes people holy (1 Corinthians 6:11). Therefore, we must take our stand upon the term Holy Spirit, because it is so precise and complete that we cannot find another. For there are many kinds of spirits mentioned in the Holy Scriptures, such as the spirit of man (1 Corinthians 2:11), heavenly spirits (Hebrews 12:23), and evil spirits (Luke 7:21). But God's Spirit alone is called the Holy Spirit, that is, He who has sanctified and still sanctifies us." (Large Catechism, Part 2, 35-36)

Article VI – Signing the Constitution

Article XV-Amending the Constitution

- A. Alteration or repeal of any alterable or repealable articles or sections of this constitution and its bylaws . . .
- B. Any dispute on Article III of this constitution and such other articles or sections as pertain to Scriptural doctrine and practice shall be unalterable and irrepealable brought to the LCMS Indiana District or directly to the LCMS office for resolution.
- C. All revisions shall be submitted to the president of the district for review by the district's constitution committee and favorable action by the district's board of directors prior to final adoption by the congregation by a two-thirds affirmative vote.

Additions and subtractions by the congregation:

Correction of scriptural citation in Preamble from 1 Corinthians 14:40 to 1 Corinthians 1:10

Article V-Communicant Membership – subtraction of ""in a divine service and" in both the reception and termination of communicant membership leaving the announcement only in the Voters' Assembly.

Article VIII-Authority of the Congregation

The Word of God and the symbols of the Church shall have supreme authority and the Voters' Assembly as a body shall have supreme authority and power . . .
